When you spot a Porsche with a mustache on the frunk, you know it's Movember, raising awareness for men's health organized by the Canada West region.

Our inaugural Movember event took place in early November at Porsche Centre Richmond which attracted nearly 20 club members.

The initial idea for the event began with Gerald Pietrykiewicz, who received encouragement from fellow club member Stella Tang. While discussing it casually at the OkTurboFest, Gary Herman, who happened to be standing beside them, made an amazing remark. "Hey, last year I raised \$3,500 for Movember". Stella Tang suggested that they all should collaborate to create an event for our club to raise funds for this important cause.

At the afternoon event, drivers attached black or white mustaches to their Porsches before heading inside the dealership. Attendees received a presentation from Movember Canada founder Mitch Hermansen, who shared the history behind the event which originated in Australia. The goal of the event is to raise funds and



awareness for men's mental health, suicide prevention, prostate cancer, and testicular cancer. Since 2006, the organization has funded the creation of 54 inventions, 70 therapies, and 107 diagnostic tests for prostate cancer, as well as cancer research programs in Vancouver.

Gary Herman gave a personal testimony on his personal battle with cancer and was living proof of the good works of Movember. He strongly believes that open discussions on men's health with your doctor, friends and family will save future lives. As of mid-November, our membership has raised over \$7,000 for this important charity. After a light lunch, the members' vehicles posed for photos and had parade laps around the Richmond Auto Mall. Special thanks to the women of our club for their support, and to Adam Isman, Marketing Manager of Porsche Centre Richmond for supporting our charity event.

There are now plans for an annual Movember event featuring an extended driving tour with more Porsches sporting mustaches.

Celebrating Gran Turismo Style

I recently had the pleasure of participating in a seven-day Grand Tour, joining over two dozen Porsches, including a GT3, a Targa, and a Macan, along with 911s, Boxsters, and Caymans. We roamed across two provinces and three states, covering over 2300 km, and enjoyed overnight stays in Oliver, Rossland, Waterton, Spokane, and Winthrop.

Our tour leader, Wayne Shalagan, described our Grand Tour adventure as Gran Turismo. This is an Italian term referring to driving a sporty, yet luxurious automobile over a long distance. Back in the 50's and 60's, this required a powerful engine, a comfortable ride, and a lavish interior, all wrapped up in stylish bodywork. Gran Turismo is how the wealthy and aristocratic crossed the European continent: at high speed, yet with the ability to easily tackle a twisty alpine road.

Our venture into Gran Turismo began on a bright Sunday morning last September. Our Porsches converged in Abbotsford, where we received our driving route handbooks and installed our Grand Tour decals on both doors and a third decal, with the names of each car's driver and co-driver, at the top of each left door.

To start, our route took us eastbound along the scenic Highway 3 to our first stop at Manning Park Resort where we were greeted by several travelling motorcyclists. It was on this route leg of the journey that I learned that when motorcyclists pat their helmets, that means 'law enforcement ahead'. A handy tip for future drives!

Hedley, a small mining town with a population of 250 was our next stop. There, we learned about the history of the region. From 1850 until the 1960's, there was plenty of


gold panned around Hedley. Even today, people still pan for gold in the Similkameen River; they say no one has yet found the original mother lode and hope springs eternal.

On Monday morning, we all departed from the Oliver Coast Hotel and headed east to Rossland after refueling. On this part of the trip, we participated in the first of a three-part rally challenge: the fuel economy challenge. A proper mileage and fuel consumption reading were required upon arrival at Rossland.

As we departed Osoyoos, we stopped at Anarchist Mountain Lookout which offers a panoramic view of both Osoyoos Lake and Washington State. Taking in this view brought back fond memories of my last visit to Penticton and Osoyoos for a winery tour story published in our club magazine in the fall of 2022. Our distance to Rossland from Osoyoos was 241 km, the shortest day drive of the tour, which left us with plenty of time to explore Grand Forks during lunch.

Upon arrival at the Josie Hotel at Red Mountain Resort on the outskirts of Rossland, we discovered a unique boutique property offering comfortable accommodations and secure garage parking for all our Porsches. The group met up for cocktails and a dinner banquet which was a terrific way to end our day.

The Average Speed Challenge, the second of three rally challenges on our adventure, was held on Tuesday morning. Each Porsche departed Red Mountain Resort at staggered times and we each attempted to maintain an average speed of 82 km/hr until we found Wayne Shalagan's Speed Yellow 911. Interestingly, we were not told the distance between our hotel and Wayne.



A few of the participants were operating GPS systems programmed to take them to our next destination, Waterton. Unfortunately, GPS took the drivers off Highway 3 resulting in them missing checkpoint Wayne and receiving a DNF score.

During the day, we visited the small towns of Creston, Fernie, and Sparwood en route to our destination, Waterton Lakes National Park. With two nights' accommodations in the National Park, we had a full day to experience the natural wonders of one of the most beautiful destinations in the Canadian Rockies.

On Wednesday morning, we all began to wash and prep our Porsches for our Show 'N' Shine in the hotel parking lot. Held in collaboration with the Vintage Sports Club of Calgary, we received a warm welcome by Chris Durtnall President.

A group of us enjoyed High Tea at the Prince of Wales Hotel, overlooking Waterton Lake, which I highly recommend. Built in 1927, the dramatic hilltop site above Upper Waterton Lake was identified as the ideal spot for the lodge in 1913 by a railway baron and President of the Great Northern Railway, Louis Hill.

If you visit today - and I recommend you do - the hotel staff are uniformed in Scottish kilts, and guests use brass door room keys. As in old London, the hotel's single elevator has an operator and is less than a square meter inside.

At noon, we all boarded a Waterton Shoreline Cruise to explore the upper and lower Waterton Lakes which cross the US-Canada Border. No passports are required for a cruise around the lakes. We learned from our tour guides about the local wildlife. We were also told that the lake freezes over in winter months, with the melting snow replenishing lake water.

On Thursday morning, we were scheduled to depart for the Going to the Sun Road, an 80 km route in BOTTOM: Prince of Wales Hotel, Waterton, AB. TOP: Sun Mountain Lodge, Winthrop, WA. northern Montana. Unfortunately, we learned that construction had resulted in several kilometres of our chosen path being loose gravel. With great disappointment, most of the group decided to reroute south. However, a few

Porsches did choose to drive the Going to the Sun Road. Around noon, several Porsches converged on a local Chick-Fil-A for take-away lunch and followed that with a quick rendezvous with Trevor, President, and Christi, of PCA - Inland Region at Woodland Park. After a group photo, other Inland Region members escorted us through Montana and Idaho to our destination in Spokane, Washington.

On the interstate, I was following a Porsche GT3 which I could hear but could not see. The engine note told me when it was accelerating; I tried to keep up to no avail. After a long day's drive chasing the ghost GT3, I looked forward to a pleasant evening in downtown Spokane.

Friday began with a Gimmick Rally, the last of our three challenges. For this challenge, we departed at staggered times and were required to answer 13 questions; such as what is the cost to get into the brothel at the motel in Davenport? After we answered the first 11 questions, one of the best parts of our driving tour was before us.

Located just north of the Grand Coulee Dam, we turned onto Columbia River Road. This quiet, twisty, hilly valley road took us into an area with hardly any inhabitants other than a few cattle and horses. This 60 km route, following the base of a rocky valley, nothing but a desert landscape with sagebrush on both sides, gave us an opportunity to experience the exhilarating dynamics of driving a Porsche.

Sun Mountain Lodge, located high above the old western town of Winthrop, was our final night's accommodation. There, we enjoyed our closing banquet and the announcement of the rally challenge winners.

Early Saturday morning, we all departed Winthrop for Sedro-Woolley, where we met up with PCA – PNWR's Vice-President Gary Barklind and viewed some of their members' Porsches. The terminus of the Grand Tour was at Scotty Brown Restaurant in Bellingham where we all said our final goodbyes.

Gran Turismo is a part of automotive history in which I am proud to have taken a part. Porsches were built for epic cross-country journeys, and we Porsche owners ought to continue celebrating the great roads, great food, and great people of our region with the Gran Turismo gusto of generations past.

But, having said that, I may need a faster Porsche; now which direction did that GT3 go?

Cars started rolling into our favorite Starbucks in Hope B.C. We were delighted to see many familiar faces as well as welcoming new ones. Once again, we were joined by a father-daughter duo which is so refreshing, a younger Gen Z joining us.

We all gathered under the Dollarama sign to be introduced to each other and then received an overview of our tour with its itinerary of events followed by our safety driving instructions.

Nine cars grouped together headed towards Manning Park for our first stop. We caused quite a stir as we arrived in unison to this busy rest stop. With a good variety of 911s from Targas to convertibles, to coupes with all ages and colours including an older silver 1988 928 S4, all demonstrating a great collection of varying engine power that performed flawlessly during the entire tour.

The group carried on to Cawston, the organic capital of Canada, where we had reservations at our favorite restaurant Row Fourteen at Klippers Organic Acres. We were joined by our tenth car coming in from Predator Ridge for the second year in a row. Just prior to our reservation we toured the general store; Klippers Marketplace and Café, located at the entrance to the property, taking in the variety of local goods. A number of purchases were made. Down the road on the same

To quote Klippers: "A table on a farm in the heart of the Similkaneen Valley, cuisine from the earth the way nature intended." Row Fourteen is situated on Klippers Organic Acres in Cawston B.C. bringing the term farm to table to a new level.

This was a great opportunity to get to know one and other sitting outdoors enjoying the beautiful surroundings. After experiencing a leisurely lunch, we departed Cawston on Highway 3E to carry on to the Watermark Beach Resort. Interestingly but not thoughtfully planned, travelling mid-week allowed us the opportunity to group together and stay together enhancing spirited driving while the spectacular views unfolded.

Approaching Osoyoos on a very hot day many of the open aired cars began to close their roofs, with the exception of one or two including the leader of the pack, who just love the sun.

As we approach the Watermark Beach Resort, we are greeted by beautiful vistas of the mountains and water. Members are able to walk, swim, explore main street, or settle into their rooms. That evening we went impromptu to a local restaurant where we thoroughly enjoyed

We let the cars show what they're made of by putting them on sport mode. Fortunately, again, being a weekday made us all more comfortable to open up our automobiles. We had the place to ourselves. Together we conquered smooth winding, scenic roads at a spirited or was it a very spirited pace, you be the judge.

Climbing up towards what we at PCA call Telegraph Hill - because there exists significant groupings of telecommunication panels and equipment. We zoomed on past continuing our hill climb to Twin Lakes where we then turned around - in case there were gravel roads ahead - and headed for the full downward drive of highway 3A taking it all the way to the notable Fairview Mountain Golf Club. Everyone was treated to amazing views and perfect roads that became the highlight of our driving tour.

Following this fun and settling our adrenaline, we searched out Phantom Creek Winery to walk the property and take in its splendor of architecture and sculptures.

Steven, their Director of Marketing or better known as their brand ambassador, walked us through five varieties of their wines providing a very engaging, humorous, and informative presentation. During our presentation we were served personal charcuterie boards created by the chef at Burrowing Owl.

Following our tasting, the Porsche convoy rallied to the Pioneer Car Wash to detail and debug their cars for the 3 p.m. beachfront 'Show and Shine.' The chance to display our cars to the local community with our own appreciation for the community. It was such a scorching hot day, that the drivers congregated under the largest tree to enjoy a cold beverage. We literally had to ply the drivers out from under the shade for photographs with each member standing by their own personal car.

The main event of the entire tour and the foundation for building this tour is scheduled for six o'clock is the Backyard Farm Chef's Table located in Oliver B.C. Our group was picked up by prearranged transportation in private coaches to take us to the farm. Please note that our wine glasses were never empty throughout the evening of Burrowing Owl's Viognier and Cabernet Sauvignon. A great thank you to the fabulous servers.

Our private coach picked us up to return us to the Watermark Hotel where we bid farewell to all our guests. Our Tour ended Friday morning where some members continued to the Okanagan and others returned home.

Tech Talk: Winter Storage

Helpful tips for storing your Porsche during the winter months.

It is that time of year when the weather turns, and many P-Cars go into hibernation or Winter Storage. There is always a lot of discussion on whether this is good for the car or not. Let's not over think this, cars are resilient machines. They will be just fine after sitting for a few months. That being said, there are things that can make their down time much easier on them.

Let's go over some items you will want to do to park your car for the winter months:

Oil: Do a complete oil change prior to parking the car. Get the old dirty oil out and replace it with fresh clean oil.

Coolant: If the car is parked outdoors or susceptible to freezing temperatures, it is not a bad idea to change out the coolant, or at least top it up.

Wash the Car: You do not want to put a car away dirty especially if you are going to put a cover on it. Waxing prior to storage is beneficial but at the very least make sure the car is washed. Clean the interior. There is no point in getting into a dirty car in the Spring. After washing, make sure the car and the brakes are completely dry before parking it. The trip to the gas station we will discuss can help with this!

Fuel: Our fuel contains ethanol which creates moisture in our tanks and fuel lines over time while sitting. You will want to add a fuel stabilizer to your fuel. Make your last drive prior to parking the car to a gas station. Do your oil and coolant prior to this trip to cycle the fresh fluids through your engine. Once you have a full tank of gas, add the stabilizer. It is approximately 200ml to 60 litres of gas. The stabilizer will help eliminate that moisture from forming. Also having the tank 95% full will help with this as well. Drive the car or run it for about five minutes after the stabilizer has been added to your fuel. Fuel Stabilizer is available at any auto parts store i.e. Canadian Tire or Lordco.

Tires: While sitting tires can develop flat spots. To prevent this, prior to parking the car over inflate the tires by 5-10 psi. This can also be done at the gas station if you don't have access to an air compressor at home. If parked in a cold garage, put a piece of carpet, or matting under each tire. This will help prevent the tire from losing a small amount of pressure while sitting.

Battery: To prevent your Battery from going dead, disconnect the negative terminal. You can hook up a battery tender to your battery while in storage. Tenders will monitor the battery level and charge it back to full when it drops. There are many brands of tenders, please research a brand or model ideal for your car. Some tenders have caused problems, so please research this before doing. If you don't want a tender hooked up all



the time, use a trickle charger for 24 hrs or as needed once a month. This is the method I use for my car. I set a monthly reminder in my phone and put the charger on the battery for one day a month.

Cover: If you use a cover, make sure it is clean and dry prior to putting it on the car. Research a recommended cover for your car. If the car is outside for storage, it is recommended to use two covers. Use an outdoor car cover recommended for your car. Over top of that cover, put a heavy-duty tarp over the car. No matter what a car cover may claim, many of them are not up to handling a full winter of weather. Again, put the covers on when the car is dry. The two-cover method is your best defense against winter weather if parked outside.

Starting the Car while in Storage: Some think starting the car up for a few minutes a few times throughout the winter is good to do. I don't know if it is or isn't good for the car and may depend on the engine you have. From my knowledge of engines when they haven't been running for a long time, if you do start it, run it long enough to get the engine up to operating temperature. When engines are started from stone cold, they create a lot of heat instantly. Which causes components to expand instantly. Let the temperature stabilize at operating temperature to allow for adjusting to this heat and expansion. If not, you can cause a shock cooling effect, which can cause cracking or damage to metal and plastic components.

If you are putting your car away for a few months, hopefully these tips will help!

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
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Discovering the Past
